1. PURPOSE

- 1.1 This report provides information for Committee on the Three Waters Stimulus package.
- 1.2 No decisions are required by Committee at this stage.

RECOMMENDATION

The Kaiwhakahaere Kaupapa-Whaipainga Project Manager-Infrastructure RECOMMENDS that Committee receive the report.

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 This report forms a summary only of projects “at a glance”. Additional reports will continue to be provided where further direction is sought from Infrastructure Committee.

3. DIRECTION

- 3.1 This section will outline the direction that Infrastructure Committee & Council provide CAAS. It will outline how projects align with Council’s direction and how these projects are being delivered in line with relevant policies and strategies i.e. Infrastructure strategy, procurement guidelines, AMPs, LTP, Annual Plan.

- 3.2 **Delivery Plan** - 8th September 2020, Council Meeting.

Resolution: That Council approve the 3 Waters Reform tranche one and delegate the Chief Executive Officer to spend the grant funds.

- 3.3 **Memorandum of Understanding** - 11th August 2020, Extraordinary Council Meeting.

Resolution: Agreeing to sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Crown, agreeing to participate in the initial stage of a central/local government three waters service delivery reform programme and authorising the Chief Executive to enter into the Funding Agreement, to accept a grant from the Crown to spend on operating and/or capital expenditure relating to three waters infrastructure and service delivery.

4. MONITORING

- 4.1 This section will refer to the project dashboard at Appendix 1. Any project areas such as budget or delivery that are highlighted Amber or Red in the dashboard will be commented on here.

4.2 Project budgets continue to be adjusted as more information becomes available. Some scopes are increased or reduced depending on the nature and priority of each project, and to cover unforeseen variations.

4.3 Opoutama Wastewater Upgrade: The upgrade of the Opoutama Wastewater Treatment Plant is making good progress. The overall upgrade project includes three parts: underground wastewater storage tanks to allow the self-contained vehicle waste station to reopen; treatment plant upgrade to improve treatment quality; expansion of the discharge field beside the plant. The tanks have been installed and will be commissioned following completion of the electronic monitoring system. The main plant upgrade is underway; the temporary bypass system is now operational which has allowed the main tank to be isolated so repairs can begin. The discharge field expansion is currently out to tender, due to start early October. A planting project is planned for the reserve adjacent to the discharge site to contribute towards beautification of the area, and further improvement of the environment.

Notification has been completed to all residents/property owners in the Blue Bay / Opoutama area, including letter drop/post and two Wairoa Star articles, which explain the projects in reasonable detail. The projects are proving to be reasonably contentious amongst a small group of people. We are working through their concerns as they become apparent.

4.4 Toby Replacement / Smart Meter Programme: Fulton Hogan have completed approximately 850 toby replacements in Wairoa, out of approximately 2200. The latest Covid-19 lockdown has impacted this project most significantly, as work could not recommence until commencement of Alert Level 2. The risk of working under Alert Level 3 conditions was considered to great, considering the project involved residents' water being turned off for periods at a time. FH are contractually obliged to deliver at least 1600 toby replacements by the 14th December 2021, however there is potential for Covid to delay this. The duration of this project is now likely to extend beyond March 2022, however, DIA are currently investigating the material impact of this lockdown, and whether or not an extension of time is warranted. The Sensus electronic smart meters have arrived in Wairoa from Europe with installation planned to start towards the end of the year. This will allow WDC to begin monitoring water loss and develop strategies for reduction/elimination.

4.5 Achilles St Water Main Replacement: This project has been awarded to Fulton Hogan, and they have committed to a start date of 4th October, taking advantage of the school holiday period. This project involves the replacement of approx. 450m of 300mm diameter water main from Kitchener St to Lucknow St. Residents along that stretch are being notified, as well as a Wairoa Star article planned for release on the 23rd September.

4.6 Wairoa Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade: These upgrades are ongoing. The new inlet screen has arrived in New Zealand, and will be installed following completion of civil works scheduled for late-September and October. The electrical and telecommunication system is being upgraded to cater for new equipment over the coming years. Eastland Network have recently confirmed there is capacity to cater for expected demand. There has been progress made regarding scoping of the Filtration and UV. WDC is partnering with Lowe Environmental Impact to scope this project, and help ensure it meets conditions of the new discharge consent, which is expected to be granted soon.

4.7 See below in Risks for the identified risks of the Three Waters Stimulus Projects. This is as per the latest quarterly report to DIA.

5. RISKS

- 5.1 This section will refer to the project dashboard at Appendix 1. Any risks outlined will be summarised with mitigation actions outlined. This will focus on the high or extreme risk levels.
- 5.2 **COVID-19 & March 2022 completion date:** The recent nationwide lockdown has had a reasonably significant impact on some stimulus projects, most notably the Toby Replacement Programme and the upgrade to the Opoutama Wastewater Treatment Plant, as indicated above. WDC have provided feedback to DIA via Crown Infrastructure Partners regarding the impact this most recent lockdown has had. An adjustment to the March 2022 completion date is expected. Currently, the risk table below highlights the DIA imposed completion date of 31st March 2022 as high level.
- 5.3 Cost overruns are expected on certain projects, which will be balanced out by projects where known tender prices/quotes are less than budgets, or where projects have been removed or scaled down. However the total \$11.04 million stimulus package will not have any cost overrun.
- 5.4 The quality of discharge from the Blue Bay / Opoutama Wastewater Treatment Plant is currently non-compliant and breaching conditions of resource consent AUTH-118685-02. The deadline for improvements and to comply with the abatement notice is 31 October 2021. As above, due to the latest Covid lockdown, HBRC have been notified that work is now likely to extend beyond October. Voluntary engagement with the community is happening via our Māori Relationships Manager, Duane Culshaw. Feedback to date has been mostly positive, however there is a small minority of residents in the area that have been spoken out against the scheme. There are concerns regarding misinformation spreading via unofficial sources (Facebook, etc) which we are working hard to try and stop.
- 5.5 Quarterly reporting to the Department of Internal Affairs (DIA) has identified several key risks to the project. The following table is taken from the most recent June 2021 quarterly report and identifies the current top 6 risks to the project. The latest report has just been submitted to DIA, with the next one due end of September 2021; and these risks will be reviewed and updated again at that time.

Smart metering (\$2.98M) is new to the Wairoa DC.	High	Fulton Hogan Gisborne have provided the expertise to begin delivery, originally planned to start March 2021, but started early May 2021 due to early resourcing issues (staff shortages). They are currently delivering a metering programme for Gisborne District Council, and have proven experience in this area. Despite the delayed start, Fulton Hogan are making reasonable progress and have completed 500/2300 (22%) toby replacements in the two months to the end of June 2021. The shipment of Sensus electronic (smart) meters has arrived and rollout will occur over the next six months.
Covid related delays for overseas equipment orders	High	This remains a significant risk to our delivery programme, although several major shipments have arrived, albeit later than scheduled. Suppliers are still experiencing shortages in the country and delays when ordering from overseas some items as basic as pipes. This risk will remain significant until the completion of the project due to the ongoing pandemic and its effects on global trade.
Lack of suppliers available to deliver accelerated works programme in such a tight timeframe	High	As indicated above, resourcing a delivery programme of this scale in such a tight timeframe comes with its challenges. Wairoa often relies on suppliers from outside of the district, and this case is no different. In addition to delivery of the 'smart' metering programme, delivery of the Filtration/UV project remains reliant on finalising the conditions of our new discharge resource consent for the WWTP, the application in which was first submitted in 2017. Several backup projects were identified in our delivery plan which are shovel ready and can be implemented if required.

6. RESOURCES

- 6.1 This section will discuss levels of resourcing such as budget, equipment, contractors or staffing.
- 6.2 Three full time Council staff have been employed through this stimulus package.
- 6.3 Overall budget is still on track to be spent by the required completion date of 31st March 2022; however, due to tight time frames and speed of delivery the some projects do not yet have a current fixed price which means there will be ongoing project adjustments and therefore variations are likely. Department of Internal Affairs understand this and are comfortable with unders and overs, i.e., some projects costing more and some projects costing less, resulting in the total Funding not being exceeded. As scoping progresses, there will be more clarity on how final budgets will sit for each project.
- 6.4 The risk of delays due to COVID-19 remain high. Several items of equipment have been ordered from Europe with an estimated 6-month lead time. Further Covid lockdowns are a possibility.

- 6.5 Several work packages are being delivered through our existing three waters contractor Fulton Hogan. Their size and presence allow access to further resource if required, which will help mitigate any project delays.






