Erena spoke briefly to her report. She spoke to the opening of the Te Reinga Bridge with many in attendance, the installation of a public toilet at Te Reinga Falls and Richard Niania recently hosting a week long wananga in Te Reinga with a lot of work being done around Te Mana o Te Wai and the waterways in and around Te Reinga and further up the valley.

The Maori Relationships Manager, Duane Culshaw noted that he is working with the property department and is liasing with Darden King to identify an individual in Te Reinga to maintain the new toilet. The Group Manager – Assets and Infrastructure, Michael Hardie noted that the toilet is not yet open to the public as it still needs to be fully installed.

8.3 HBRC MAORI RELATIONSHIPS MANAGER REPORT

COMMITTEE RESOLUTION 2024/218

The Pouahurea Māori Māori Relationships Manager RECOMMENDS that Māori Standing Committee receive the report.

CARRIED

The Hawke's Bay Regional Council (HBRC) Māori Relationship Manager, Nathan Heath spoke briefly to his report highlighting that the HBRC Long-term plan consultation started that afternoon outside of New World and the Wairoa Community Centre and the powhiri of Te Wairama in Nuhaka at Kahungunu Marae. He noted that he has not yet had a response about the option of bringing woodchip to Wairoa and will follow this up again before the next committee meeting.

Members briefly discussed the issue of drain ownership and responsibility and the impact Cyclone Gabrielle has had on the districts infrastructure. Whaiora raised concerns from whanau in regards to the size of certain pipes/drainage systems being installed. Members discussed the need for identifying this work as BAU or recovery. The Acting Chief Executive, Gary Borg advised that the draft recovery plan will be sent to the Chair and from there they will decide how a recovery agenda item will be tabled at this committee.

Erena questioned the estimated figure of 500 tonnes of silt still under whanau homes and asked what the estimate now is. The Acting Chief Executive, Gary Borg advised that an update on recovery will be provided to the Finance Committee in the afternoon, where the question can be tabled and the response communicated back to committee members. She also raised maintenance currently happening 5km down the Tiniroto road and the result of Cyclone Gabrielle taking more parts of a section of the road which could potentially cut off areas from each other. The Group Manager – Assets and Infrastructure, Michael Hardie advised that this job alongside many others in the district are awaiting funding from NZTA, however, WDC are monitoring each site. He noted that he will report back to the Chair once advised of the list of priorities from NZTA.

The Chair welcomed any updates from Takiwa representatives.

Te Wairoa Hōpūpū Takiwa – Amanda Reynolds

Amanda thanked Council for the urgent work on the Rangiahua slip and having this cleared for whanau in the December 2023 rain.

Te Wairoa Takiwa - Whaiora Maindonald

Whaiora noted tabling a report on Ruataniwha Road and how it goes right to the end, however, whanau cant access their urupa in the winter as it hasnt been maintained by the Council over some time and the potential of having this re-metalled.

The Maori Relationship Manager, Duane Culshaw noted he will follow-up with the Group Manager – Assets and Infrastructure.

Pāhauwera Takiwa - Theresa Thornton

Theresa noted she would still like to send the invitation to Mangataniwha and to get the Council up there to witness their mahi.

She asked the Māori Relationship Manager, Duane Culshaw to provide a report on Te Huki Marae as she has been approached by multiple trustees over matters not dealth with including when the AGM will be held and the need to replace a trustee.

She also asked if the committee will be writing a submission to the Fast-track Approvals Bill currently out for consultation. The Acting Chief Executive advised that a submission is currently in progress on behalf of Council to the Fast-track Approvals Bill and will workout the timeline for this to share it with the committee.

Ruakituri Takiwa – Erena Hammond

Erena noted concerns from whanau in not having the Glengarry care facility service in the district anymore. She further raised concerns from Rangatahi about raupō being removed and taken to the dump along Frasertown road where work is occurring in the drains. The Group Manager – Assets and Infrastructure, Michael Hardie advised that this is a state highway project, however, will follow-up and provide and update to the committee on the issue.

The Meeting closed at 11:09am with a closing karakia given by the Chair, Henare Mita.

The minutes of this meeting were confirmed at the Māori Standing Committee Meeting held on 28 May 2024.

<u>Ruataniwha Marae</u>'s chairperson has asked if she could meet with a drainage engineer to discuss the drain in front of the marae. She has also asked if they could have a Tangihanga sign.

<u>Takitimu Marae</u> are still doing a bit of cleaning and have had drainage done in the field in front of the marae. They are unable to start any work on their marae until they receive some funding as they weren't insured.

<u>Hinemihi Marae</u> would like to have the Whakapau end of Ruataniwha Road reinstated. At the moment it is a challenge accessing both of our urupa, particularly during winter. We are also having a problem with feral cats. There are so many that we're at a loss as to how we can tackle this problem. HBRC did a great job with the possum problem so I'm wondering if they could come to the party with the cats.

<u>Ta Whiti A Maru Marae</u> had their AGM on the 5th of May but have decided to have another special meeting as someone put their name forward as a Trustee after the meeting. Mary Jarden-Lewis is the Trustee Chairperson. They are unable to move forward with their rebuild decision until they know what the HBRC and WDC have decided on the flood options.

I have noticed that we have graffiti on the carwash building and on the boundary fence between Gull and the Bowling Club. Would the council be able to approach the owners and ask if the rangatahi that painted the murals on the Community Centre would be able to paint murals on those areas to discourage graffiti?

Māori Standing Committee:

Well done to you Fiona, for contacting the governance team well before our last meeting (16 April) and tending your apologies. And thank you to Sarayde for all your hard work ensuring Whaiora and I had the necessary agenda documents for the Ordinary Council Meeting of 7 May. We realise you have a lot to do in preparation for these meetings, so really appreciate your efforts. I was happy that Whaiora enjoyed the experience and trust that the rest of our committee will find it just as beneficial. We are fortunate in that we get to see our elected members in this context and just how much work goes into their role. What is also abundantly clear is the contribution of council staff to the success of these meetings.

Nuhaka Playcentre:

In late April I was informed that metal poles and shade cloth had been stolen from Nuhaka School. Like most people I was angered by the news, stupefied as to why anyone would be callous enough to take from children. More information would follow in the Tuesday 30 April Wairoa Star, where we would learn that the theft occurred at the Nuhaka Playcentre, detailing the full extent of the crime, adding that whoever the culprits were, had employed a digger to complete the task. The use of a commercial vehicle was confirmed by eye witness accounts, the thief(s) brazen enough to carry out their act in broad daylight. Authorities have been given a description of an individual and the tractor used in the crime. Fingers-crossed, this will be plenty enough to find and apprehend them.

On a more positive note, Nuhaka School is now officially closed to the public in readiness for the removal of asbestos.











Te Poho o Te Rehu Marae:

On Thursday the 18th of April, Te Rehu Marae hosted a holiday programme facilitated by Oranga Tamariki (OT) Wairoa, under the mentorship of Eddie Karauria and Dominique Conway. They played host to two Oranga Tamariki groups, one from Hastings and the other from Napier. This visit viewed as a way of affirming the identity and heritage of their young charges, many of whom, along with two staff members having strong ties to Wairoa. It was an opportunity for them to see their maunga, their awa and marae. It was a real privilege to share this occasion with them and cannot say enough about their positive response.







Hīrere Stream Taiao Management Project:

Without a doubt, one of the most enjoyable projects I have ever had the pleasure of attending, was facilitated by Te Iwi O Rakaipaaka Trust (TIORT) regarding their Hīrere Stream Taiao Management Project, located near the intersection of Tamakahu and Riripeti Streets. The Hīrere Stream flows from west to east beside the disused railway tracks, large sections of which have now been disassembled, along with the relocation of a significant amount of loose metal. A new depot containing the equipment of project engineer, Damian White, sits on a portion of this stripped area and on Tuesday, the 14th of May a sizeable crowd assembled in preparation for the arrival of Nuhaka School staff, parents and students.







They had been invited to participate in the first stage of a three-phase riparian planting schedule. Over 400 plants of 70 different varieties, purchased from the Wairoa Community Ngahere Nursery, had been provided by TIORT and because this was scheduled to be a morning activity only, Damian's team had already predrilled the necessary holes. The children along with their minders were given a demonstration on what was required of them and following a brief Q&A session were able to proceed at their leisure. Assistance was readily available, but the children, staff and parents operated like a runaway locomotive. A little before lunch - a celebratory sausage sizzle - the intrepid army had returned to home base, a job very well done.







In truth, the Hīrere Stream Taiao Management Project aspires to fulfil two major goals. One that relates to the enhancement of the stream and surrounding areas and the other that concerns the improved resiliency of this area to future flood events. A major coup has seen NZ Rail return a large portion of this land to the school with TIORT in further negotiations to have more lands follow suit. Selected culverts have been replaced, drains cleared and in some cases reconfigured to allow a more efficient flow of water along the Tamakahu Street drains or alternatively, into the Hīrere Stream. There is still more work to be done, but it does offer greater confidence to the school, marae, and residents along Tamakahu and neighbouring streets.









The first two photographs show tracts of the now disassembled railway line. A large amount of loose metal was also removed from these areas and relocated temporarily to the depot. The third photograph shows a major problem area. The drain has been reconfigured to allow a better flow of water to the Hīrere Stream, while the final photograph shows a recently constructed fence built from materials found strewn about at the mouth of the Hīrere Stream.


Wairoa HBRC activity report for April 2024.

- 1) HBRC update including issues and Council & Committee meeting items of local relevance.
 - **HBRC Te Pou Whakarae pōhiri** I attended the pōhiri for Te Wairama Munro as the new Te Pou Whakarae for HBRC on 16 April. Te Wairama, who has been Interim Pou Whakarae since Pieri Munro left and has officially now started in the role.
 - Long Term Plan Public consultation was held on the 16th and 18th of April. Submissions for the 2024-2027 LTP close on 15th of May. Further information and a link for submitting can be found via https://www.consultations.nz/hbrc/3yearplan/
 - Government Inquiry into the Response to the North Island Severe Weather Events Was released on the 23rd of April https://www.dia.govt.nz/Government-Inquiry-into-the-Response-to-the-North-Island-Severe-Weather-Events. The inquiry was undertaken by an independent panel lead by Sir Jerry Mateparae. This follow's on from the Independent Review to the HB Civil Defence Emergency Management Response into Cyclone Gabrielle that was released in February.
 - **HBRC Committee meetings and items of interest** April was a quiet month for Council Committee Meetings because of school holidays.
 - 10 April Regional Council workshop (Clifton to Tangoio Coastal Hazard Strategy), Council Meeting discussing the 3 Year LTP for public consultation.
 - 24 April Regional Council workshop Flood Resilience Strategy

2) Wairoa District Update.

- Alice Wilson who has been part of the Catchment Delivery Team in Wairoa has been appointed a
 Senior Rural Advisor for Wairoa. This is a new role and Alice will be working closely with catchment
 groups and working with the primary sector and landholders to support recovery following Gabrielle
 and in implementing good land management practices.
- Nuhaka & Whakakī update work has commenced on the construction of the weir in the Rāhui
 Channel at Lake Whakakī. HBRC and WDC council staff met with Ministry of Education, engineers and
 contractors to progress the Nuhaka school rebuild.
- Predator Free Mahia significant work to completely eradicate possums from the Mahia Peninsula is still progressing. Trail cameras, extensive trapping and dogs are being used to identify where the remaining possums are living and contractors used to focus on the Mahia Scenic Reserve and forestry blocks where some concentrations of possums still exist. A virtual barrier of bait stations and traps to prevent future infestations of possums into Mahia has been put into place and is being maintained on a regular basis. The HBRC team of Allan Beer and Andrew Richardson are doing a great job pursuing the local community aspiration of a predator free Mahia. The project is looking to extend through to the end of this year.
- The HBRC Environmental Monitoring team undertook fish surveys at several sites across the rohe this
 month as part of the on-going work the HBRC Science team are undertaking to better understand the
 impacts of the severe weather events on waterways and aquatic life. A second round of eDNA testing

- has recently been carried out across 11 different sites in the district and all data gathered is being collated into a component of the State of the Environment Report that will soon be produced.
- Other local issues raised this month included the smoke at Mahia Beach, gaining permission from owners for contractors to undertake works maintaining and upgrading the Paeroa drainage scheme, enquires around the woody debris activity and burning, wānanga with the whānau at Te Reinga looking at the long term restoration of their whenua, supporting the cultural impact assessment work for the flood protection project and Whitiwhiti Ora project.
- I attended the Matangirau Reserves Board meeting on 30 April 2024. Multiple items were discussed including restoration plans for Matangirau Reserves, river bar management, erosion at Rangi-houa, funding for silt and woody debris removal on whenua māori, river management of the lower Wairoa River and the Wairoa River Reserve Restoration project.
- Wairoa items of significance
 - Announcement of the shift of the provisional land categorisation of Wairoa properties from 2A to 2C has been made. The project will now be consulting the community to progress the shortlisted options for flood protection.
 - The WDC independent flood review was presented to Council in April and can be viewed via https://www.wairoadc.govt.nz/assets/Document-Library/Reports/Wairoa-Cyclone-Gabrielle-Review-April-2024.pdf
 - Community hui were held earlier in the month with staff from East Coast Lab to korero about our proximity to the Hikurangi Trench Subduction Zone and the potential impact on our communities of a significant earthquake or tsunami. The bottom line for those living in coastal communities is having your whanau prepared by knowing when and how to act should an event happen independent of advice from someone else.
- The infographic below was recently compiled by the team in the Wairoa Office to show the work they have undertaken with landowners over the last 3 years.

The Māori Relationship Manager Northern HB presented his report and reported there is one other matter that have arisen since then the Pouahurea Maori | Maori Relationships Manager and I were approached very recently to provide guidance on mana whenua engagement around the land categorisation process as you are well aware the shift in the categories from 2a to 2c require

a plan or proposal around flood protection to enable that to occur.

The Māori Relationship Manager Northern HB commented it is at the moment been driven by central government and is been driven at pace locally to primarily to stop the whanau who are doing it tough at the moment to stay in limbo for a long periods of time so sooner Councils get the plan out the quicker Councils can change the category from 2a to 2c and things can start changing insurance companies can pay out, funding can come in as there has been issues associated with that up to now.

The Māori Relationship Manager Northern HB advised the problem for Councils is co-ordinating mana whenua engagement is enabling that to be done properly, with time and tikanga it does not agree with the timeframe in which Councils are trying to push this through so what Councils are proposing in doing, these have not been locked down in any shape or form, holding two Marae hui where specifically the land categorisation process is discussed and what they are seeking from those hui the consultants themselves is options around what flood protection might look like for Wairoa.

The Māori Relationship Manager Northern HB also advised it is not the actual construction, it is not the definitive plan it is taking on board any information, any korero, matauranga into consideration for design of the different options that might be put in place. From that the proposal is then to come back once they start whittling down those options, start modelling those different options through their different flood models as to what is feasible, what works and what costs that might be associated with that, when they start narrowing that down the proposal is to come back again and check that with the whanau and move onto the next step. The Māori Relationship Manager Northern HB asked if there are any korero, any thoughts the Committee might have that could be done any better is much appreciated it.

The Chief Executive iterated this is particularly as it relates to whenua Maori. The Māori Relationship Manager Northern HB commented this is the complication as it relates to whenua Maori it is actually Te Puni Kokiri that is leading that however the flood protection and the development of the flood protection is a different process, it is all of the community and mana whenua process itself and there is so many moving parts half the challenge is navigating those moving parts.

The Māori Relationship Manager Northern HB also let know Te Puni Kokiri is in Wairoa mostly everyday at the WYAT office from 11.00am – 1.00pm.

The Chief Executive advised to have an opportunity for all the whanau to be informed and also explained the Tripartite Agreement which is Tatau Tatau o Te Wairoa, Hawke's Bay Regional Council (HBRC) and Wairoa District Council. HBRC is particularly responsible for flood mitigations. At a meeting recently of the Tripartite partners it was resolved that the Tripartite partners would have governance oversight of the flood mitigations work going forward.

Cr Cairns queried when is the consultation or engagement process have to be completed by. The Māori Relationship Manager Northern HB replied hoping to have all options identified, narrowed down and costed by December.

The Chief Executive informed the Committee and the new Committee coming in to build stop banks and to design spill ways land acquisition will be needed for engineering solutions. The Chief Executive also informed the Committee when it affects whenua Maori this Committee becomes vitally important to being able to advise, suggest, kia tika, kia pono, kia aroha and allows mana whenua to be included in a process and what are the treaty implications particularly for whenua Maori.

Cr Cairns advised those sitting in offices creating the potential plan to mitigate and provide flood

The Chairperson queried the work that Hawke's Bay Regional Council had done in Nuhaka regarding the drain and the Māori Relationship Manager Northern HB explained the Asset management team had identified issues within the drain itself that impacted the abilities to meet certain delivery standard, they were not huge so they had cleaned out the impacted part.
