PURPOSE

1.1. The purpose of this report is to update the Māori Standing Committee on the work undertaken by the Hawke's Bay Regional Council Māori Relationship Manager (Northern Hawke's Bay) for the month of August 2024.

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Monthly Report for Wairoa, Mohaka & Northern Catchments – August 2024 Nathan Heath – Māori Relationship Manager (Northern Hawke's Bay)

Wairoa HBRC activity report for August 2024.

1) HBRC update - including issues and Council & Committee meeting items of local relevance.

- On Wednesday 28 August, HBRC Councillors voted unanimously to retain our Māori constituency seats
 on Council. This secures Māori seats for the 2025 local election, however, the amendments to the Bill
 requires Council conducts a binding poll at the 2025 local government election to determine whether
 Māori Constituencies can be kept for the 2028 local election onwards.
- Lawrence Yule has been appointed as the Crown Manager for Wairoa to oversee the flood protection
 project in North Clyde and the reduction of potential impacts from future flooding in Wairoa.
 Lawrence will be working closely with the Wairoa Tripartite of HBRC, TToTW and WDC and local flood
 protection project team to ensure the project progresses at pace.
- There has been a slight delay to the release of the Wairoa flood event independent reviews that have been carried out over the last month. It is anticipated that these will be released early next month.
- A reminder to all that there are opportunities for those suffering significant financial hardship at the
 moment for a rates remission from HBRC. More information on the eligibility for a remission and how
 to apply for one can be found via https://www.hbrc.govt.nz/services/properties-and-rates/rates-remissions/
- HBRC Council and Committee items of significance
 - 21 August Māori Committee Meeting & Workshop Decision making for the Electoral Legislation and Māori Ward & Constituencies Amendment Bill & HBRC Mātauranga Framework
 - 28 August Regional Council Decision made re: Electoral Legislation and Māori Ward & Constituencies Amendment Bill, Implementation recommendations from reviews arising from Cyclone Gabrielle.

2) Wairoa District Update.

- I would first like to acknowledge the passing of Kate Wood who recently joined HBRC as a Senior Rural Advisor. Many of you may know Kate in her role with MPI, she was heavily involved in supporting our districts farmers during and following on from all the storm events we have experienced over the last few years. Kate was a great advocate for Wairoa and played a significant role in the successful North Island Weather Event application for \$800,000 to support the development of community resilience hubs. Our hearts go out to Kate's whānau and friends.
- This month both Steve Fabish and Sue Wilson joined the HBRC Wairoa office team. Steve joins HBRC following his significant time with both WDC and GDC supporting them during the recovery from Cyclone Gabrielle and managing the GDC FOSAL home buy out process. Steve has been appointed as the Senior Project Manager for the Wairoa Flood Protection Project. Sue is well known throughout the district with all the huge work she does supporting our rural communities. Sue will be coordinating the community engagement around the project locally. We welcome them both to the HBRC Wairoa whānau.

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- Some of you may have noticed the boat traversing the awa around the Wairoa township over the last
 few days. Bathymetric surveying is being carried out on the depth of the Wairoa River channel at
 multiple locations in the river. This is done on a reasonably regular basis and following on from both
 flood events adds valuable information to the flood protection kaupapa.
- Asset Management update Work is about to begin on drain maintenance at Tawhara, Whakakī & Nuhaka drainage schemes as shown below. Cultural impact and ecological assessments have been carried out and all landowners contacted. 40% of the drain maintenance work is now completed on the Paeroa scheme and Staff are continuing to work with other landowners and marae to progress the remainder while ground conditions improve. Further planning and scoping of drain maintenance work in the coming months is currently occurring. Inanga are spawning at the moment which will have an effect where work can be done in the short term.







Local HBRC business this month has included, attending the WDC Māori Standing Committee and HBRC Māori Committee hui, working with Tātau Tātau o Te Wairoa on the Taiao Unit project and planning, Ngāti Rakaipaaka to update on local activity and better coordinate communication, Rongomaiwahine Iwi Trust with on-going Te Mana o Te Wai project progression, the HBRC Kotahi planners and PSGE Taiao Leads and Managers hui, an update from HB Emergency Management team members and coordination of an agency hui to progress issues at Māhanga.

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• Finally I would just like to thank Te Iwi o Rakaipaaka Trust and Nuhaka School, for the invite to the planting of the mauri stone and karakia at the Nuhaka School site this month. Construction has now begun with rebuilding the school after Cyclone Gabrielle. It was a really enjoyable and positive event to attend, plenty of excited Nuhaka School kids in attendance as well on a beautiful day! Really nice to have something uplifting to go to after what seems like a particularly long winter.



Items of interest

The Parliamentary Commissioner for the Environment produced a report recently looking at the use of models in Freshwater regulation and Management. The work being undertaken in the Mohaka Catchment by the Mohaka me Waihua awa project team was used as a case study in the report below.

3.5 Update for Solid Waste Programme

3.5.1. To reiterate, the WDC gave a presentation to the Joint Committee on 20 February 2024 whereby a resolution considered, '...that the Committee is open to the possibility of accepting Wairoa District Council solid waste at the Ōmarunui Landfill on a short term and/or long term basis and that any confirmed request to accept

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- Wairoa District Council solid waste would be the subject of a separate report to the Committee and/or the parent Councils (Hastings District Council and Napier City Council)'.
- 3.5.2. On Friday, 20 September 2024 a small contingent of WDC representatives attended the Ōmarunui Refuse Landfill Joint Committee meeting at the Hastings District Council (HDC). The WDC was formally requesting that a temporary access agreement for disposal of solid waste to the Ōmarunui Landfill for a period of up to three years, until a permanent solution can be confirmed.
- 3.5.3. Whilst the WDC was already considering the future of its landfill and due primarily to extreme weather events and additional waste generated from these events, this request brings forward the WDC's previous request as the situation at its own landfill is now insufficient to adequately meet the ongoing needs of the Wairoa population.
- 3.5.4. The Joint Committee recommended and resolved that, '...the Committee approve the request from the Wairoa District Council to accept up to 4,000 tonnes per annum for their solid waste at the Ōmarunui Landfill for a period of up to three years'.
- 3.5.5. The formal conditions of this resolution are currently underway between the WDC and HDC, and among these conditions is the commitment of the WDC to continue to engage with mana whenua (Ngāti Hinepare, Ngāti Maahu and Ngāi Tawhao).

Haere ki o nui me o rahi, rātou e manaakitia nei e o tātau matua-nui-i-te-rangi. Noho wairua mai koutou i raro i te tuanui o tōna temepara, māna koutou e manaaki, e tiaki. Haere te po, nau mai te ao, rātou ki a rātou, ā, tātau ki a tātau. E te tī, e te tā tēnā koutou, tēnā tātau katoa.

MSC Meeting Turei 20 Akuhata:

Thank you to Mayor Craig Little and Honengenenge member Whaiora Maindonald for tendering your apologies before our August meeting. I also want to acknowledge our remaining committee members for ensuring we satisfied a quorum. There are murmurs that we have some interest in one of our vacant takiwā seats and I look forward with interest to this development.

Infrastructure and Regulatory Committee:

I had the privilege of attending an Infrastructure and Regulatory Committee meeting in September and was impressed by their wide range of agenda items. I am convinced that we would benefit from having a seat on this committee as well as the Strategy, Wellbeing and Economic Development Committee. I know that Council is giving this serious consideration.

Ōmarunui Refuse Landfill:

I was privileged to sit in on a meeting between Mayor Craig Little, CE Kitea Tipuna, Pouahurea Māori, Duane Culshaw and the Ōmarunui Refuse Landfill Joint Committee, hosted in the Hasting District Council Chambers on Friday 20 September. The purpose of our brief visit was to participate in the formal approval of an agreement between Ōmarunui Refuse Landfill Joint Committee and Wairoa District Council. The agreement, once ratified by Hastings District Council CE Nigel Bickle, will allow Wairoa District Council to dispose of residential Solid Waste Refuse at the Ōmarunui Refuse Landfill for a three-year period. Mayor Little and Kitea present to answer questions, speak to the impending negotiations and thank the committee for their understanding, as WDC works to find a long-term solution to their solid waste disposal difficulties.

Kahungunu Marae:

Kahungunu Marae held a 75th commemorative anniversary for their wharenui on Saturday the 31st of August. Deputy Mayor Dennise Eaglesome-Karekare represented Council, but because proceedings got so far behind, Deputy Mayor Eaglesome-Karekare was unable to stay. Part of the commemoration ceremony paid homage to Kahungunu Marae as a war memorial, with Hawke's Bay Regional Naval Officer Lieutenant Commander Paul Eady officiating the laying of a wreath, to commemorate those of the armed forces who have passed on. Following Mr Eady was Ikaroa-Rāwhiti MP, Ms Cushla Tangaere who delivered a very entertaining speech. The highlight however was a zoom presentation by American Jonathon Fairbanks, based on

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the memories, letters, journals and photographs belonging to his father, who undertook his mormon mission in Nuhaka at the time Kahungunu Marae was being built.









Maintaining A Marae:









One of the major responsibilities for all marae trustees and whanau, is the continual maintenance of their marae. During the commemorative celebrations, Kahungunu Marae chairman, Terry Hickling, spoke about some of the maintenance work they have had to deal with. You will note from the above photographs for instance that the exterior whakairo of the wharenui have been removed. Heavily weather-beaten and infested by insects, only specialists workers can restore them, the tekoteko for example had literally been hollowed out. To add to their woes, the trustees found that the wharetaonga, Te Tahinga, although a more recent building also required significant maintenance work.

Manutai Marae:

Further to the maintenance theme, Manutai Marae whanau have spent two weekends pulling down an old fence, erecting a new one, installing bollards and building a brand new waharoa. They had a great turn-out mid-September, completing an amazing amount of work. Another working bee may well see an end to their labours. In August, Manutai was scheduled to host a wānanga by Mereana Pitman, but due to unforeseen circumstances was postponed.















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Wāhi Repo:

Work on the Nuhaka wetlands continues unabated with the landscape now dramatically changed. Te lwi o Rakaipaaka Trust, Taiao facilitator, George Rārere has stated that there is still a lot more work yet to be done.
